
To that end, we must exercise caution in the midst of flooding and must *never* attempt to cross floodwaters—whatever their depth may be. Public service announcements reiterate this simple, life-saving message through the "Turn Around, Don't Drown" campaign, which reminds us of the sobering reality: a mere six inches of moving water can carry away an adult, and large vehicles require a depth of only two feet.

Throughout the United States, stakeholders in the public and private sectors labor as one to shed light on the dangers of flooding and to encourage proactive safety measures. By educating ourselves about floods and the proper response to them, we can stave off the worst outcomes and ensure that these disasters do not have the final say in Texans' lives.

At this time, I urge my fellow Texans to research flood safety and to teach friends and family members about this important subject. Although flooding is largely inevitable, we can indeed mitigate the possible harms, and by so doing, we will bring about a safer, stronger tomorrow.
