# COMMISSIONERS COURT Special Meeting July 29, 2011

**Public Hearing regarding Proposed Redistricting**

Meeting begins with Judge Bonn leading the citizens in the Pledge to both flags. Then Judge Bonn turned the meeting over to Charles Kimbrough, an attorney with Bickerstaff, Heath, Delgado, and Acosta. They are helping Caldwell County in the redistricting process. Judge Bonn addresses those who would like to speak to fill in the information requested on the sign-in sheet outside the room.

Charles Kimbrough and Manuel Mendez began by handing out Public Hearing Comment Forms. They request that if anyone would like to comment on the redistricting topic this evening to please fill out a form completely and return it to them. Mr. Mendez begins the presentation by referencing the printout of the Initial Assessment-Benchmark and the Illustrative Plans, 1& 2. Mr. Mendez talks about the Benchmark information and the statistical analysis. He speaks about the one person one vote requirement for preparing the redistricting plans. There are two more key elements that the Department of Justice will be looking at. One is whether or not there is any retrogression. Also to make sure there is not any discrimination regarding race, creed or language minority. The court has provided data that they feel best fits the County and it has been used with other input, along with the Department of Justice Guidelines to create the Illustrative Plans and to evaluate from the choices and submit the one that best serves the County. He explains the changes, both on the maps and the population percentages on each Plan.

The following citizens filled out forms to comment on the Illustrative Plan of their choosing. They were Precinct 3 Judge Alfonso Campos, Mary Alice Llanas, John Castillo, Philip Ruiz and Tom Matthews.

Philip Ruiz is concerned that the Two Illustrative Plans that are being reviewed have left Commissioner from Precinct 4 out of his precinct. When redrawn, he believes that there will have to be another Public Hearing to approve another Illustrative plan that places him back in.

Judge Alfonso Campos believes that after 10 years tinier can not be voted out of his elected position because of redistricting. He would like to see State Highway 130 included in Precinct 3 and believes it can help to bring revenue. He is favorable to Plan 2, as it creates very clear and definitive boundaries and allows for JP Precincts 3 and 4 to continue growing.

Mary Alice Llanas is not pleased with Plan 1 because of Hwy 80 being used as a boundary. With Fentress and Prairie Lea being small communities, she feels it will be a burden on the senior citizens in the community and that the division of Hwy 80 will be confusing to them at voting time. It also creates conflict for Prairie Lea ISD since most students live in Pct 3. She states Plan 2 seems to be a better plan all around.

# Special Meeting on July 29, 2011 Public Meeting regarding Proposed Redistricting

Dr. Tom Matthews is concerned about Plan 1 and the issue of Community of Interest. He would like to see Prairie Lea and Fentress tied in with Luling. He asks why Precinct 2 is so large. He feels that Luling has been lost in the growth of Precinct 2. Would like to see it be decreased on the NE side, and be increased West to State Highway 130. The prairie Lea and Fentress community ties are closer with Luling. Dr. Matthews thinks the map should be changed. He feels that the voters have been done a disservice.

Commissioner Roland comments that Dr Matthews question about Communities of Interest was a good point. Commissioner Roland asks Mr. Mendez if that topic was considered and comments that we have a close knit community and that it will be fractured.

John Castillo felt that the public should have had more than 3 days of notification about the Public Hearing. He asks why there was not more notice. He feels that this item should have been discussed at a regular Commissioner Court meeting. He asks what the deadline for adopting a plan is and when the final plan has to be set in place.

Dick Wyland asked how the Commissioners Court narrowed down to 2 Illustrative Plans? Questions if there will be confusion among the citizens of who their Commissioners would be?

Mr. Mendez thanks the citizens for comments. They look forward to working on a final plan that will serve Caldwell County.

Judge Bonn closes the Public Hearing at 7:10 p.m.
