What Is a Protective Order?

A protective order is a civil court order issued by the Court, in order to prevent family violence or threats of family violence to you, your child, or your entire family depending on the circumstances. A protective order can protect against family violence, stalking, human trafficking, and/or sexual assault by ordering the respondent to stay away from you and have no contact with you for a period of up to two years. Family violence includes:

- An act by a member of a family or household that is intended to result in physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault to another family or household member OR
- A threat that reasonably places the victim or applicant in fear of imminent physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or sexual assault.

Member of a family or household can apply to relatives, former spouses, foster parents and foster children, individuals who are the parents of the same child, and anyone else living in a house, even if they are not related.

HOW TO FILL THE APPLICATION OUT:

- 1. Fill it out thoroughly and to the best of your knowledge.
- 2. Your affidavit must contain a brief summary of the most recent incident of family violence and/or describe if there is a history of family violence with the Respondent.
- 3. In order to serve the Respondent, you need to provide a good address on Respondent; if you don't know his/her whereabouts, we will try to obtain it.
- 4. This application <u>MUST</u> be signed in front of a Notary Public. If you need an appointment with a Notary, please contact us at the following phone numbers: 936-336-4650 & 936-391-2571, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.
