Following discussion, a motion was made by Commissioner Neal and seconded by Commissioner Thompson to approve an order, in accordance with Texas Tax Code Section 312.401, V.T.C.A., authorizing the Winkler County Commissioners' Court to create a reinvestment zone, to be entitled the *ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone*, for the purposes of attracting major investment, contributing to the retention or expansion of primary employment, and contributing to the overall economic development of the County and authorizing County Judge to sign same; which motion became an order of the Court upon the following vote:

AN ORDER DESIGNATING APPROXIMATELY 320 ACRES OF LAND, TO BE DESCRIBED AS THE NORTHEASTERN ½ OF THE 640 ACRES OF LAND LOCATED IN SECTION 22, BLOCK B-11 OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOL LAND SURVEY, WINKLER COUNTY, TEXAS AS A REINVESTMENT ZONE, PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 312 OF THE TEXAS TAX CODE; MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of the County of Winkler desires to create the proper economic environment to encourage the investment of private capital in productive business enterprises located in certain areas of the County and to provide employment opportunities within such areas; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that the information indicated in Exhibits A, B, C, D, G and H, and the approximate, specified 15.81 acres contained therein ("the property"), which are incorporated herein for all purposes, are within the County of Winkler; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that the improvements planned for the property are feasible and practical and would be a benefit to the area after expiration of any subsequent tax abatement agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that the designation of the area as a reinvestment zone is likely to contribute to the retention and expansion of primary employment and is likely to attract major investment in the area; and

WHEREAS, after notice was published in accordance with Texas Tax Code Sections 312.401(b) and 312.201 (d), and a public hearing was held to consider this order on April 22, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that it is in the County's interest to designate the property as a reinvestment zone, pursuant to Texas Tax Code Section 312.401.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF THE COUNTY OF WINKLER, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the County hereby designates the 320 acres of real property, to be generally described as the Northeastern ½ of the 640 acres of land located in Section Twenty-two (22), Block B-11 of the Public School Land Survey, being situated in the County of Winkler, State of Texas, further illustrated and described in the survey map and metes and bounds descriptions attached hereto as Exhibits G and H, respectively, all those certain tracts or parcels of land, legally and more particularly described as, but not limited to:

A thirteen and sixty-four one hundredths (13.64) acre tract of land out of Section Twenty-Two (22), Block B-11, Public School Land Survey, conveyed in deed at Book 183, Page 226, Winkler County, Texas; and

A one hundred foot by one hundred foot (100' x 100') tract of land located in Section Twenty-two (22), Block B-11, Public School Land Survey, filed on record in Volume 288, Page 145, of the Deed Records of Winkler County, Texas, amended to the aforementioned document conveyed in deed at Book 183, Page 226, Winkler County, Texas, added to the Northeast corner of the thirteen and sixty-four one hundredths (13.64) acre tract of land described in the above captioned document, being a plant site location located in Section Twenty-two (22), Block B-11, Public School Land Survey, Winkler County, Texas, which document is dated the 29th day of January, 1962; and

A two and one-hundred sixty-nine one thousandths (2.169) acre tract of land, situated in Section Twenty-two (22), Block B-11, Public School Land Survey, Winkler County, Texas as a reinvestment zone, to be entitled the "ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone."

Section 2. That the County finds that the designation of the area as a reinvestment zone is likely to contribute to the retention and expansion of primary employment, is likely to attract major investment in the area, and will contribute to the economic development of the County.


Section 3. That the County finds that the property meets the legal qualifications necessary to receive designation as a reinvestment zone, pursuant to Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code.

Section 4. That this order shall take effect from and after its passage as the law in such case provides.

Section 5. If any clause or provision of this order shall be deemed to be unenforceable for any reason, such unenforceable clause or provision shall be severed from the remaining portions of the order, which shall continue to have full force and effect.




**ORDER OF THE WINKLER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT  
AUTHORIZING A TAX ABATEMENT AGREEMENT WITH ENERGY  
TRANSFER AND ITS SUBSIDIARIES, INCLUDING SOUTHERN UNION GAS  
SERVICES, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE WINKLER COUNTY TAX  
ABATEMENT GUIDELINES AND CRITERIA**

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Winkler County (the "County") has adopted Tax Abatement Guidelines and Criteria for Winkler County in order to encourage the development of primary employment and to attract major investment in the County; and

WHEREAS, the County has elected to become eligible to participate in tax abatement agreements under the provisions of the Texas Property Redevelopment and Tax Abatement Act (Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code); and

WHEREAS, the County established the ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone pursuant to an Order dated April 22, 2013 (the "Reinvestment Zone"); and

WHEREAS, Energy Transfer and its wholly-owned subsidiary, Southern Union Gas Services applied for a tax abatement (the "Energy Transfer/Southern Union Gas Tax Abatement Application"), subject to the Tax Abatement Guidelines and Criteria in place at the time, in connection with a proposed gas processing facility expansion in the ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone (the "Proposed Facility"); and

WHEREAS, the Proposed Facility includes an approximate planned investment of \$29,000,000 within the Reinvestment Zone within Winkler County; and

WHEREAS, the improvements for the Proposed Facility as set forth in the Energy Transfer/Southern Union Gas Services Abatement Application are feasible and of benefit to the Reinvestment Zone after expiration of an abatement agreement; and


WHEREAS, granting a tax abatement would attract major investment in the Reinvestment Zone and would contribute to the economic development of the County.



BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF WINKLER COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That the Commissioners Court approves the "Energy Transfer Abatement Agreement for Property Located in the ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone," the specific provisions of which shall be drafted and agreed upon by both parties, to be subsequently approved by action of the Commissioners Court or County Judge on behalf of the Commissioners Court.
2. The Commissioners Court authorizes the County Judge to execute the "Energy Transfer Abatement Agreement for Property Located in the ET/SUGS Halley Reinvestment Zone."

RUBY LEE MARTIN BEEBE  
100 Years Old on April 29, 2013

Ruby Lee Martin Beebe was born April 29, 1913, in South Bend, Young County, Texas, into the family of George and Maggie Martin, the sixth of seven children. She grew up with two brothers and four sisters.

The family lived a rural life of homemaking, farming cotton, raising beef cattle, dairy cattle, chickens, and gardening. Life was full of family love from her devoted and tender parents. Ruby walked to school with her older siblings and endured many pranks and teasing from her brothers who were always there to protect her when the need arose.

She learned to sew, quilt, cook and can from her mother and older sisters, becoming a very accomplished homemaker. She loved to sew, especially baby clothes. Expectant mothers always anticipated a beautiful outfit and quilt from her, so much more beautiful than anything they could have bought.

Ruby was 5 years old in 1918 when the flu pandemic called "Spanish Flu" swept across the globe killing millions of people. That time is very vivid in her memory. She, her mother, an older brother, and her baby sister became ill. Only her father, George, did not get the flu, leaving him to nurse his family. There were many graves to be dug. Her father would only leave them to do a few chores and for grave digging detail. They lost many dear, dear friends, but were blessed not to lose any immediate family members.

Ruby raised chickens when she was 14. She won 1<sup>st</sup> place at the Young County Fair and won an all paid trip to the Ft. Worth, Texas, County Fair, a real eye-opener for a small town country girl with all the sideshows and such. As she grew up, she learned to play the very popular game of "42", a domino game, by standing beside her dad and watching him play the game, starting a love of competitiveness.

By the time she reached high school, she had learned to love the game of basketball. South Bend had a championship team and a star player in Ruby. About eight years ago, we found out that three of the girls from her basketball team were all living at a nursing home in Graham, Texas. The son of one of the team members set up a phone conference call for Ruby and the three former teammates to visit. They really had fun remembering their glory days.

Her dad bought a Model T Ford for the family although he never wanted to learn to drive. The older children drove and as each one left home, the next in age took over as family chauffeur. Ruby loved driving to the rodeo where her brother was a bull rider, and to the Stovall Mineral Wells hot baths.

By the time the depression of 1929 came along, only Ruby and her younger sister were at home. They would pick up pecans in the fall from the trees close to the Brazos River.



There was always fresh fish from the river as well. As a true Texas girl, she would only wade in the river – she wouldn't learn to swim.

Ruby met Paul R. Beebe sometime in 1930, after he moved to South Bend to find work in the oilfield. They were married in March of 1931. It was a very hard time for everyone financially. They worked wherever they could in the oilfield picking cotton, working cattle, and dairy. By 1937, they had two children, Martin and Alice. Paul saw an ad in the paper for a job with a brand new company called El Paso Natural Gas. They needed men to dig the pipeline. When that job was over, he went back to South Bend and worked in the dairy. Then he received a letter from El Paso Natural Gas with a job offer as plant operator in New Mexico. He eventually moved his family to Bennett, New Mexico. Bennett was right in the middle of the sand dunes, with no trees, and no green plants, except for the Yucca plants. She felt like she could see forever. She was not real fond of the hot barren land with no trees.

Paul was born in 1941, while the family still lived in Bennett. The closest hospital was in Jal, New Mexico. He was the only family member born outside of Texas.

Around 1943, they moved to their first El Paso company house, at Jal Plant #2. The job with El Paso was a turning point in their life. Financial burdens were eased, they had a wonderful home, parks where the children played, and dear friends who had moved from South Bend to Jal for work. Camp life was like another family – everyone looked after each other, and many wonderful lifetime friends were made. Ruby was very active in her church, working with the Sunday School, the ladies' Bible class, and quilting one afternoon a week.

January 1946 brought the birth of another son, Claude. It also brought the family a move into a little bigger house at Camp #2.

Later that year, a promotion to repairman for Paul moved them to Keystone Field in Kermit, Texas. Camp life was a very close community where friends were made for life. The men built a croquet court with lights for evening playing. That and competitive forty-two domino games made for some fun times. The family also enjoyed going to the local football games to watch Martin, the oldest child, who played for the Kermit High School Yellow Jackets.

In 1949, the family moved to El Paso Plant No. 3, a brand new plant and camp, with Paul as Assistant Superintendent. The family also moved into their first 3 bedroom house. Later that year, Paul was promoted to Superintendent at the El Paso Plant in Denver City, Texas.

In 1950, when the Korean conflict started, Paul and Ruby each had a nephew in the conflict, and Ruby would send monthly care packages to them. Paul's nephew was killed in the first year of the battle. Ruby's nephew sent names and addresses of his buddies who weren't getting mail. Ruby and Alice would write to them and send them care packages as well.

Paul and Ruby's oldest son, Martin, married his high school sweetheart, and gave them their first grandchild, Terry, in 1951. He was the first of 14 grandchildren, followed by 23 great-grandchildren, and 29 great great grandchildren.

The family moved back to Jal to Plant Number 1, where Paul had originally started with El Paso Gas, in 1953, with Paul taking the job of Superintendent. In 1954, the family moved to Plant No. 4, the company's "Show Plant", where they lived till the early 1970's, when they were moved to the Keystone Plant in Kermit.

The grandchildren all loved her fantastic cooking, especially her German Chocolate Cake and her chocolate chip cookies. She would always hide them before family dinners so nobody would spoil their appetite before dinner. The kids, of course, would always hunt all over the house for the goodies. She changed the hiding places all the time, so it wasn't easy to find the goodies. When they come to visit now, they always tease her.

In the early 1960's, Ruby got new furniture for her living room, which included a coffee table with a marble insert. At one of the family dinners, the grandkids turned the marble slab over in the table, leaving the unpolished side up. A few days later, when Ruby was cleaning house, she thought something terrible had happened to her table and that it was ruined. When Paul came home for lunch, she was totally distraught. To her dismay, it was all a prank, and he was in on it. He returned her table to its former splendor, but the grandkids were afraid to go visit next time.

Paul retired from El Paso Natural Gas in 1973, and they bought a house in Kermit, the first time since 1937 that they didn't live in a camp. They retired in Kermit because of friends and the Church family. At that time, their children were all grown with families of their own, living or working in Guam, Columbia, Libya, and Texas.

Ruby and Paul stayed active in the church, enjoyed daily walks, and visits with friends. In 1981, Paul and Ruby celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary with all their children present, many of their grandchildren, brothers, sisters, cousins, and lots of friends. In 1992, Paul passed away. Following his passing, close friends, and especially her neighbors, kept a watchful eye, and generously assisted her. Her son Claude moved from Oklahoma in 1993 to be close, and her daughter Alice and her husband Darrell moved from California in 1996.

In 2008, Ruby decided to sell her house, and has since been living with Darrell and Alice in their home. Although many of her friends have passed on, she still enjoys sharing stories of family. She enjoys family get-togethers, and is really looking forward to celebrating her birthday with family and friends, and hopes she can remember all of them. :-)

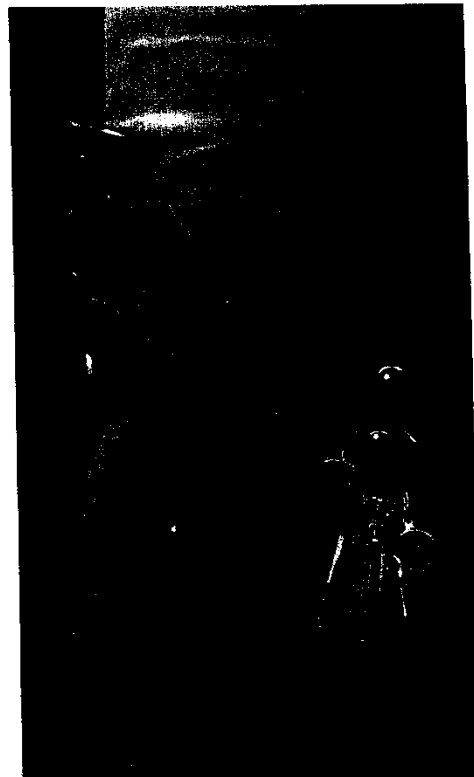

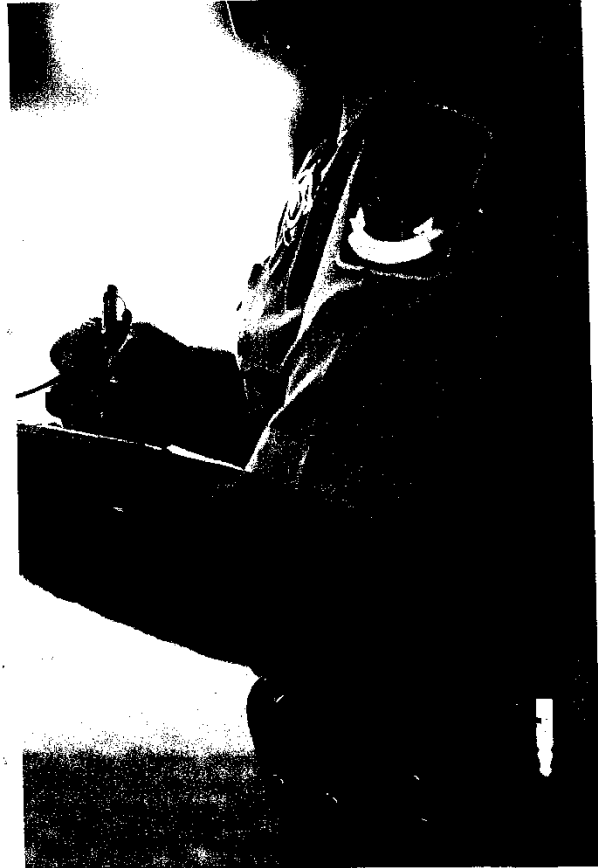
*Eighteen peace officers were feloniously killed in Texas between 2005 and 2007. As we honor the sacrifice of our fallen brothers and sisters, we must also learn from these tragedies so that we may prevent them from happening again. That's where COPsync comes in.*

- Of the 18 officers killed feloniously, 3 were ambushed, 4 were shot during or at the conclusion of a traffic pursuit, 6 were shot responding to domestic disputes, and 2 were shot during arrest proceedings. These officers all died from gunshot wounds.
- Every officer, every day, everywhere is in life threatening situations and often times threatened by those they are sworn to protect.
